

Chord Shapes:



- A 5 chord is also known as a power chord, and essentially it is a chord that is neither major nor minor, but rather just an interval of the root and 5th.
- Lets look at E major, E minor chord and E5 chords
 - E G# B E Major
 - EGB-EMinor
 - E B E5 or E power chord
- You'll see they have two of the 3 notes in common, the only note that is different is the note in the middle, which is the 3rd interval. So when you look at the E5 we removed the guide tone, the color tone, the note that defines the chord and we get this chord that is neither major nor minor, this makes them easier to sing over, easier to experiement with in chord progressions and easier to solo over. All that, in addition to being great with disotration, make these the chord choice for rock and punk music. They are hard to play on the Ukulele though, so in the song instead of C#5, we play C#m7, which is the iv chord in the key of E naturally, if you like the rock sound more feel free to play the C#5 anywhere I play a C#m or C#m7.

Intro riff



- This was the hardest part to arrange on the ukulele
- The highest string on the guitar is E so they can strum away and get a nice drone sound, but we can't really do that so this is about as close as we can get
- Take it slow and count it out
- If you don't like the bend you can also slide from the 3rd fret to the 4th fret on the C string



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

- When playing octaves you have to mute the E string with your fretting hand so you can strum them.
- This takes time and can be tricky so be patient
- If it is too hard you can just play the notes on the C string as a riff, but you will loose a lot of the energy from the song

- In the recording this riff is being played against the open E string of the guitar, but we would have to retune our ukulele to get that effect, so this is just the melody of that riff
- This would be played over the verse.
